Isolation

As the first school in Tamworth has experienced having to close a bubble, I thought I would clarify when people should isolate and seek a test.

	Situation	Isolate?
1	I have tested positive for Covid-19	YES – 10 days and 48hours clear of high temperature
2	I have developed a symptom and not yet tested.	YES – until you test negative – if the test is positive follow scenario 1 above.
3	I have been told I am a close contact of a case.	YES – 14 days
4	I am a close contact of someone who has tested positive. I have been tested and I am negative	YES – for 14 days unless you develop symptoms and then test positive (see number 1)
5	A household member has developed symptoms and not yet tested.	YES – until they test negative – if the test is positive household isolates for 14 days
6	A household member has been told to isolate as a close contact	NO – be vigilant, if they start to develop symptoms then you will need to isolate until they test and its negative.
7	I visited someone, within 2m, who has now been told to isolate as a close contact	NO – the person was not symptomatic. If within 48 hours of the visit they develop symptoms and test positive, follow number 3.
8	My sibling is in another class bubble and needs to isolate due to positive Covid 19 case in their class. I am in a different class bubble.	NO – they are not themselves a close contact of a positive case, if their sibling develops symptoms then they need to isolate as per number 5.

The symptoms currently recognised as Covid-19 symptoms are:

- * New persistent cough
- * High temperature (38° or more in children)
- * Loss of taste or smell

There are other symptoms so **if your child is unwell** we would advise that you keep them at home to monitor their symptoms. Contact 111 or your GP for advice on whether your child needs to be tested.

Thank you for your ongoing support. The systems and structures in school are now embedding and working well.



WINDSOR CASTLE

THE ROYAL FAMILY IN WORLD WAR II

At the outbreak of the Second World War, Princess Elizabeth (now The Queen), then aged 13, and her sister, Princess Margaret, aged 9, were on holiday at their Scottish home, Balmoral. Their parents, The King and Queen, had had to leave them to return to London. The Princesses stayed in Scotland until after Christmas and then went to Sandringham, their Norfolk home. After that, they went to live in Windsor Castle, and it was there that they spent most of the war, although they sometimes went to Balmoral or to Sandringham or, for instance, to stay with Queen Mary who stayed with the Duke of Beaufort at Badminton during the War. Other members of The Royal Family also lived away from London at this time.

The King and Queen and their daughters were protected by officers and men from the Brigade of Guards and Household Cavalry and arrangements were made for them to be taken to safety in the event of an invasion by German troops. King George VI and Queen Elizabeth usually spent the day at Buckingham Palace, returning to the comparative safety of Windsor Castle to sleep. Many of the staff who were normally employed at Buckingham Palace also spent the war at Windsor.

Buckingham Palace was hit by bombs nine times during the war, most notably on 12th September 1940, when it seems to have been a deliberate target, and several bombs were dropped, making craters in the courtyard, killing one man and wrecking the Chapel. (The Queen's Gallery is now on the site of the Chapel). Although bombs fell on Windsor on several occasions, the Castle suffered no damage.

At both Buckingham Palace and Windsor Castle there were air-raid shelters. Those used by The Royal Family were basement rooms within the main building and they had to use them on many occasions. Both buildings had blackouts, and the most valuable works of art were put into storage for safety.

Just like everybody else, The King and Queen and The Princesses carried identity cards and had ration books for food and clothes. They kept their own clothing coupons but the food coupons were kept in the Supply Section at Buckingham Palace so that their food could be obtained at the same time as that for their staff. Their rations were supplemented by produce from the Royal Gardens.

In February 1945, at the age of 18, Princess Elizabeth joined the A.T.S. (Auxiliary Territorial Service), learning driving and vehicle maintenance. She did her training in the Windsor area, so was able to remain at Windsor Castle, after which she became a Subaltern and, by the end of the war, had reached the rank of Junior Commander.
